PASTOR'S MESSAGE

"From the rising of the sun to its setting, the name of the Lord is to be praised."

-Psalm 113: 3, NRSV

The leaves change their colours, the days become shorter, and the air is crisp and fresh. Autumn has arrived, and with it a celebration of friendship, family, and the abundance of the harvest.

As you prepare for this new season, I invite you to take a moment to notice.


- Notice the sun's rising and falling, as the days shorten and the night deepens.
- Notice the people around you as they change from the colours and styles of summer to the warm weather clothes of Fall and Winter.
- Notice the birds moving overhead, the sounds of wind whistling through the trees.
- Notice yourself: your breath, your body, your "youness." As the seasons change, how are you changing? How is God transforming and working in you, through you?
- Where do you sense God's presence or handiwork?

Consider the sunflower. It is so attuned to the sun that it moves to follow the sun throughout the day, soaking in its warmth and energy.

As we enter a new season, let's take a cue from the sunflower by finding moments to notice the Earth and world around us, to pay attention to the creative work of the Holy Spirit, and to give thanks. Join the Psalmist who sings, "from the rising of the sun to the setting of the same — the name of the Lord shall be praised."

May gratitude inspire joy so that gladness and thankfulness might be this season's theme!


October 26: Reformation Sunday – Thank you, Martin Luther.

BOOK REVIEW - Giving to God



I grew up on a small farm in rural Saskatchewan. We never had much, although we did not lack for the necessities of life, so it was difficult not to compare with neighbors who seemed to have more of the good things of life. My fear was if I gave something away, I would not have what I needed.

Bible scholar Mark Allan Powell, has written a book well worth reading: *Giving to God:* the Bible's Good News about living a Generous Life. Powell has written an excellent guide faithful to the teaching of Scripture, and to the promises of Christ. He looks at stewardship as a joy-filled aspect of our relationship with God. Our primary concern is not what we should do – whether to give our money away, where we should give it, or how much we should give. The good news of Scripture is more about learning to give to God as something we will want to do.

In giving to God, we are expressing that all we are, and everything we have belongs to God, and we put this faith into action when we offer ourselves and our possessions to be used as God sees fit. When we do this, we discover God provides us with everything we need to be content. As well, we discover giving becomes a bond that brings us closer to God, and helps us to become the kind of people we want most to be. Faithful use of our time, talents and money begins with a satisfying relationship with God. We can learn to give generously out of our heartfelt connection with God.

This is not a "money management' book but a resource to give us direction on how to live a joyful, more satisfying life of faith. Jesus was not a fund-raiser. He talked about money a lot, not because he wanted people to give to any particular cause. He talked about money because he cared about us, and because he knew that what we do with our money affects who we are spiritually.

We often say, "Give from the heart!" But Jesus seemed to say, "Give where you want your heart to go, and let your heart catch up". Don't just give to things you care about, but give to things you want to care about. If I asked myself, if I were the sort of person I would really like to be, then what would I do? How would I spend my money and my time? Put your treasure where you want your heart to go, and your heart will follow. Mark Allen Powell's book is in our church library, and I encourage a wide readership.

SUMMER PEOPLE'S FORUM REPORT

In June, I travelled to Calgary to attend two People's Forum events: the G7 Jubilee People's Forum organized by Kairos, and a grassroots event hosted by the International Migrants Alliance. These events were planned to align with the meeting of world leaders in Kananaskis.

I attended as a congregant of Holy Spirit and to support and share the social justice work of this congregation. I travelled with Whitney from AWARE, helping to support 3 youth who were sharing their personal experiences with attendees, of living as undocumented children in Alberta, the impact that being denied access to education has had on their lives, and their activism through the Educ4All campaign.

The G7 Jubilee People's Forum was an interfaith conference "representing hundreds of thousands from around the globe who believe that by uplifting Indigenous voices, Global South voices and the voices of people of faith and conscience... demanding a more equitable, sustainable and humane future." (Kairos, 2025). The vision of conference organizers is to build, from the ground up, a Jubilee world – "...where enslaved and indentured people are freed, debts are cancelled, and the land is returned and allowed to rest. A world where economic and ecological justice and decolonization are the norm, not the exception."

The conference began with an interfaith service led by the Calgary Interfaith Council. His Eminence, Pedro Cardinal Barreto from Peru opened the conference. This was followed by voices from a wide variety of faith traditions who shared religious teachings connected to debt, relief and sharing. The evening closed with Langar provided by members of the Sikh community.

Over the weekend we participated in sessions highlighting the social, economic, and cultural costs of "debt" and to envision different models for our future. I was present to hear Yael, Dayana, and Ariana, the undocumented youth from Edmonton who are fighting for access to K-12 education, share their powerful stories during the Migrants and Jubilee session. Throughout the weekend we shared information about the Educa4All campaign and



collected signatures for a petition the youth hope will go to the Alberta legislature this fall.

The Jubilee movement calls for mobilizing communities of faith and conscience to demand:

- Debt cancellation
- Global financial reform
- A debt resolution framework within the United Nations

In addition to participating in the Jubilee conference, I met on Saturday with community groups and activists from across Canada engaged in work from tenant rights and labour protection to military disarmament, Indigenous land rights and protection of the environment. We discussed the challenges people are facing, successes and setbacks in advocacy, strategies for mobilizing action and how groups can engage in greater collaboration.

A few takeaways from the weekend:

- Community activism is formed by, nurtured by, and an extension of faith. While not all social justice work is directly a faith-based activity, it is faith that roots and sustains many people's activist work. What kind of activists are being raised and nurtured by this congregation?
- Religious spaces are vital for grassroots organizing. They are one of the few spaces where mutual aid rather than economic profit is operating. Religious spaces provide safe refuge. A tablemate, who worked in Hong Kong, shared ...

- ...that the churches have been at the center of organizing for migrant workers as it is the only space for meeting outside the view of employers and the state. It made me think of the welcome this congregation has given to various community groups, including FAM and Educ4ALL. It made me consider how we as a congregation extend and expand our vision of "all are welcome and all means all."
- Justice and faith are intertwined and are not exclusive to religious communities.
- The youth are leading the charge in envisioning and demanding a more just world. What are we doing?
- Sometimes the most powerful and scary thing we can do is show up. How will I "show up" today?


